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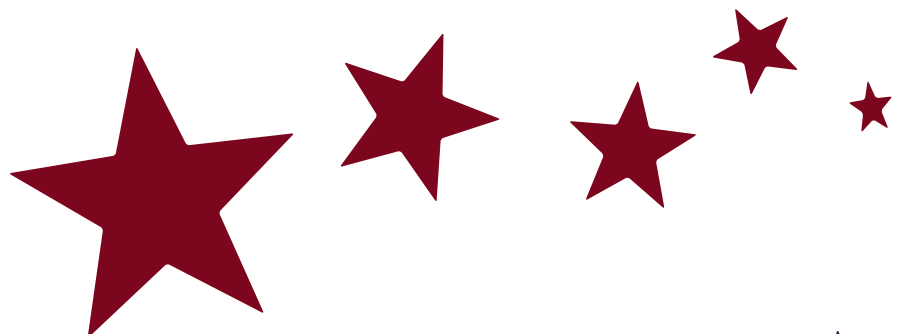

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GENERAL RULES & GUIDELINES

1. All halls, amusements and exhibitions will open and close of daylight savings time. Halls will remain open from 10am to 7pm.
2. An entrance fee of 10% of the first premium will be charged for all entries in each department so designated with the exception of such departments where a special entrance fee has been established or where it specifically states that no entrance fee is required.
3. Persons intending to exhibit are required to list each entry by giving Department, Section and Class Number of each entry. **Entries will be received only on blanks furnished by the entry clerk preceding the fair.**
4. All articles to insure an eligible place and the attention of the Judge must be in the enclosure and submitted to the Superintendent one day preceding the fair, except for livestock. **Entries will be released Sunday July 6, 2025 5pm8pm and Monday July 7, 2025 10am12pm.**
5. The Superintendents in charge of the several departments will give aid to the several sets of judges as they may require.
6. No article shall compete for more than one premium, except for animals shown in a herd class.
7. All animals and articles presented for competition must be the property of the exhibitors for at least 30 days prior to entry. Property of a firm may be considered the property of any member thereof.
8. The entry of any animal entered as a purebred, must be accompanied by certificate of registry.
9. Any person who shall violate the regulations of the Society, or shall seek to obtain premium by false pretense, or by improper interference with a judge, shall be excluded from competition.
10. The entry clerk will promptly after the exhibition, prepare a statement in the form of an order for each exhibitor listing all premiums and purse awards. The premiums and purses shown by statement to have been awarded will be paid to the exhibitor or purse holder, before September 1st, but unless said statement is presented before November 1st, the premiums and purses will be considered forfeited to the society and will not be paid. Any person making an entry and exhibiting any article or stock or participating in programs of skill or speed does so subject to these General Regulations.
11. In all cases where Judges are not satisfied that the rules of the Society have been complied with as to the regularity of the entry, they will suspend decision and apply to the Secretary.
12. The Executive Committee shall fill vacancies in the committee of Judges by the appointment of suitable persons to act as such judges.
13. **In case the receipts of the Society shall be insufficient in any year to defray the expenses of this Society and to pay in full the purses and premiums won and awarded that year, then and in that event, the net receipts remaining after the payment of all expenses of the Society, in full shall be apportioned and divided prorated among such exhibitors as have been awarded prizes that year, each of such exhibitors receiving of said net receipts such and among or percentage of the same as the total of his/her award bear to the whole amount of said net receipts and said percentage shall be received by such exhibitors in full satisfaction, of the total amounts of his or her awards. It shall be in the discretion of the officers of the Society to enforce this regulation or not as a majority of the said officers may deem advisable.**
14. **The Premium ribbons or cards have no value as to payment of premiums, as premiums are paid only from the records of Judge's books.**
15. No person shall have the right to be allowed to be on the race track during the time when said track is required for the races, or within any enclosure or ring bonded by post or ropes, either prepared for the exhibition of



horses or cattle or for any other purpose upon the grounds during exhibition, except the Superintendent of the Judges.

16. A police force will be kept on the grounds night and day, during exhibition. The Society will endeavor to provide precautions for the safety of the patrons while in attendance upon the exhibition and for the safe keeping of all articles or goods of exhibitors. **But the Society assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage to either person or property, and every person entering the grounds during the exhibition does so subject the General Regulations and all entries of goods and articles for premiums are made and received subject to the General Regulations.**
17. All protest must be made in writing accompanied by a fee of \$5.00, signed by the person aggrieved, or by his authorized agent and must state plainly the cause of complaint. Such protest must be delivered to the secretary within two hours of the alleged cause of protest. The burden of proofs shall rest upon the party protesting to sustain the protest, and said party shall be allowed ten days from the time of filing the protest and the person or persons making such protest shall pay all expenses caused the Society by making such protest.
18. No Judges may enter in competition, for premiums, in the departments in which they are judging.
19. The Board of Managers reserve the right to construct bleachers and make the appropriate charge of seats thereon and permit or make charges for concessions, special attractions and admission of supply trucks or conveyances.
20. There will be no first place tie.
21. **Notice: Sale or Distribution of any merchandise, including printed or written material, except under license issued by the Agricultural Society of Oswego County and/or from a duly licensed location shall be prohibited. Note: The above rule was adopted at the 1983 convention of the N.Y.S. Association of the Agricultural fair after a resolution to that affect was submitted by the Altmont Fair.**
22. Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to distribute or sell written materials or solicit funds from other patrons of the Fair, without regard to the content of the information being distributed or sold in regardless of the purpose of the solicitation of funds unless one or more of these activities take place from a booth or concession stand rented for one or more of these purposes.
23. The rental of a booth or other concession stand shall be on a "first come, first serve basis". Nothing heron contain shall be constructed to deny a person the right to express their views within or without the Fairground.

COMMERCIAL EXHIBITORS AND CONCESSIONARIES

All buildings containing livestock will be disinfected under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture

24. Concessionaires of every nature shall make application with the Fair Office or Superintendent of Concessions, and will be required to sign a written contract and make a monetary deposit. Before being allowed to transact any business on the Fairgrounds he must furnish the Society with a Liability Certificate of Insurance and hold proof of Workman's Compensation, if required, also vendors must be registered with the NYS Sales Tax Dept., furnish the Fair Office with his/her Registration Number, display their "Original Certificate of Authority" at his or her booth during the entire length of Fair.
25. The Management reserves the right to cancel at any time, for reasons satisfactory to it, all contracts made with concessionaries or others.
26. Only such privileges are granted for concessions and attractions as are required to supply the wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience and pleasure, but the Management will not accept or knowingly allow the continuance of any concession, show or attraction of a questionable nature, nor will any privilege be allow permitted where the business is conducted in other than a legitimate and tradelike manor.
27. Concessionaires must abide by the laws of the State, County, Town and rules of the Fair Board Manages (the condition under which concession was granted). Anyone found violating these laws will be closed, will forfeit his concession money paid, and will be ordered from the Fair Grounds.



28. Concessionaires must confine himself to the space assigned him. No Concessionaire or Exhibitor will be permitted to sublet or share any portion of the space allotted to him. A violation of this rule will result in the original purchaser of the space forfeiting all his rights, ejection of himself, partners, employees and wares from the grounds.
29. All drinking and eating concessions must furnish themselves with proper sanitary equipment that will comply with the rules and regulations of the State Health Department. This rule will be strictly enforced. **All Garbage must be placed in plastic trash bags ready for the collector.**
30. Concessionaires must keep their spaces in a neat and sanitary condition removing from any filth or refuse, and placing the same in trash bags.
31. Food and drinks must be wholesome and sold at reasonable prices. All concessionaires shall keep a **PRINTED or PAINTED SIGN** posted in plain view in the front or entrance of place of business showing prices to be charged for meals, lunches or other articles of food and drinks offered for sale or for services to be rendered. This is to be approved by the lesser.
32. All soundproducing equipment must be of such nature as not to cause annoyances or inconvenience to visitors or other exhibitors. Permission for use of same must be first obtained from the Concession Superintendent.
33. Any Concessionaire or Exhibitor doing business with firms or persons who are not properly authorized by the Management will be subject to cancellation of their contract to operate.
- 34. DELIVERIES AND SOLICITORS**, Delivery of merchandise, articles of food, soft drinks, or service or the solicitation of businesses and orders from the concessionaires, exhibitors and others on the fair grounds are prohibited until such delivery men, solicitors, or firms they represent have made arrangements for such delivery and solicitations by obtaining privileges for the same from the Concession Superintendent.
- 35. Except in the case of emergency, no vehicles will be admitted to the midway after 10 a.m. and only then, by permission by Concession Superintendent.**
36. Delivery men and solicitors **will not be** permitted to retail, sell or give away any food, soft drinks, goods, wares, or merchandise, except to bona fide concessionaires who occupy regularly leased concession space on the Fairgrounds. Any violation of this rule will be sufficient cause to exclude any person, firm or others from the grounds.
37. Deliverymen and Solicitors **will not be** permitted to leave their automobiles, trucks or conveyances in such a position as to cause congestion.
38. The Management assumes no responsibility in case of damage, loss or injury to person or property caused by reason of neglect or willful acts of any person, firm, or their agents, representatives, servants or employees, or from any cause whatsoever, having license to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying space thereon, and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability all persons causing some or liable for any debt incurred by a concessionaire or exhibitor for any salary or expense due to any of their employees. Neither shall it be concessionaire or exhibitor or for any salary or expense due of their employees. Neither shall it be responsible for the result of any accident or damage to any person or persons, to any animals or to property from any cause whatsoever.
- 39. No pets such as dogs, cats, ferrets, but not limited to working animals are allowed on the grounds.**
40. The Management reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any person or persons whom they deem undesirable, or expel from the grounds such person or persons who shall violate any part of these rules.



PART 350 STANDARDS FOR CONDUCT OF FAIRS

Section 350.1: Entry Fees Maximums. Entry fees shall not exceed ten (10) percent of first premiums, except in poultry departments, where the fees shall not exceed twentyfive (25) percent of first premium. However, a flat charge of two dollars (\$2.00) per entry may be made in the cattle department in lieu of the ten (10) percent of first premium. Any deviation from this standard must receive the approval of the commissioner.

Section 350.2: No fee for 4H, FFA, Junior Fair or School departments exhibits. No entry fee shall be charged for 4H clubs, FFA, Junior Fair exhibits entered for competition in their own classes, or for entries in the School Department.

Section 350.3: Prompt full payment of premium. All premiums advertised and awarded must be paid promptly and in full, without deduction in the guise of donations or otherwise, notwithstanding any statement to the contrary or in modification thereof announced or stated in the premium book.

Section 350.4: No premium for unworthy exhibit. No premium should be awarded by any judge or paid by any Society for an unworthy exhibit.

Section 350.5: Premium amount to attract wellbalance exhibits. The amount of premium offered in the various departments should be such as to secure wellbalanced exhibits, in the light of the types of agriculture carried on in the territory served by the fair.

Section 350.6: No exhibits by judges in department oversee. No judge may be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for premiums in the departments in which they are connected.

Section 350.7: Exhibits to be plainly labeled. All exhibits must be plainly labeled so that the full significance of the exhibit will be made clear.

Section 350.8: Reexhibition in domestic department. No articles shall be permitted to be exhibited in the domestic department if it has been previously exhibited therein, unless by official action of the Board of Directors of any Fair Society, exception is made to this requirement

Section 350.9: Exhibits in the name of a bona fide owner; ownership of horses entered in 4H shows or exhibitions, poultry, sheep swine limits:

- A. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner.
- B. Ownership of all exhibits must have existed for at least thirty (30) days previous to the time of showing.
- C. Proof of ownership of all exhibits must be presented by the exhibitor on request of the Fair Society.
- D. In case of horses entered in 4H horse shows or exhibitions the animal may be owned by exhibitor, or his immediate family.
- E. In such department as poultry, sheep and swine the number of breeds that an exhibitor of family shown may be limited to the number of breeds determined by official action at a meeting of the Board of Director of any Fair Society.

Section 350.10: Rejection or refusal of an exhibit. Any Fair Society shall reserve the right to reject or refuse and to order the removal of any exhibit, which, in the opinion of its Board of Directors, is not eligible or worthy of showing or has not met the livestock health requirements.

Section 350.11: Compliance with an enforcement of livestock health requirements. Each fair of exhibition which receives money from the state pursuant to article 24 of Agricultural and Markets Law shall comply with and enforce the livestock health requirement set forth in Par.351 hereof.

**Animal Health Requirements For
Admission to New York State and County Fairs**
(Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and Markets Regulations)
NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets/Division of Animal Industry

The 2026 Animal Health Requirements for Admission to New York State and County Fairs, Part 351, or AI-202, now includes BOTH requirements for in-state and out-of-state animals. There will not be a separate document for interstate requirements. Where applicable, sections are clearly marked when requirements apply to in-state or out-of-state animals or both. This is the *only* document to print and refer to for 2026 fair regulations.

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A. General Prohibitions and Requirements

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds for any reason (show, exhibit, raffle, demonstration, display) during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.



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- Any animal which is subject to inspection upon entry to the fairgrounds will be inspected without covering (wraps, coats, head gear, etc.).
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious, or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to, or require removal from, the fair premises or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of, or exposed to, any infectious, contagious, or communicable disease.
- The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious, or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.
- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

B. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- The CVI must be issued by a USDA Category 2 accredited veterinarian. Wet ink signatures for paper CVIs or e-signature for eCVIs are accepted.
- An e-CVI may be issued but a paper copy of the e-CVI is required for the animal check-in process so it can be physically initialed and dated by department staff.
- All animals must be officially identified. **All manmade and official ID must be recorded.**
- Only one species is allowed per CVI.

NEW YORK STATE-ORIGIN ANIMALS:

- ✓ A valid intrastate CVI (AI-61) is required for cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, alpacas, deer and miscellaneous ruminants.
- ✓ The CVI must be issued on or after May 1st of the current year.

OUT-OF-STATE ANIMALS:

- ✓ All animals entering New York State must satisfy both import requirements and fair requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- ✓ The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the New York fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVIs can be used multiple times for entrance into a qualifying [NYS Agricultural Fair \(linked here\)](#)



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(<https://www.nyfairs.org/>) The initial entrance into a ([qualifying NYS Agricultural Fair](#)) must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. The name of the fair must be recorded on the CVI. For the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NYS Agriculture and Markets official noting the location of the initial, qualifying NYS Agricultural Fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

- ✓ **New York does not participate in the New England Exhibition Show and Fair Circuit.**
- ✓ Questions regarding import requirements should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3971, or at the division's import/export homepage: <https://agriculture.ny.gov/animals/animal-import-export>

C. Animal Identification

- All manmade and official ID must be recorded. Record full ID tag numbers.
- Do not record ID that is yet to be applied to / within an animal.
- Cattle: All cattle must be identified by an official USDA radio frequency identification (RFID) eartag, commonly referred to as an "840 RFID tag" or equivalent official RFID tag if the animal was tagged in another country.
- Sheep and Goats: All small ruminants must be identified by official scrapie identification.
- Swine: Swine must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended.
- Equids: A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches/photos and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars, and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. Names, tattoos and microchips, if any, are to be recorded. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.
- Llamas and Alpacas: New world camelids must be identified by official ear tag or microchip.
- Miscellaneous Ruminants: They must be identified by unique ear tag or microchip (i.e.: aoudad, antelope, chamois)
- If you are exhibiting animals identified by microchip, a working reader must be supplied by the exhibitor. For questions on animal identification please contact your veterinarian or our office at 518-457-3502.



D. Rabies Vaccination

- Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are *4 months of age or older* on the date of admission to the fair.
 - For most rabies vaccines, the earliest age allowable for primary vaccination is 3 months (12 weeks). Animals that are vaccinated prior to 84 days of age will need to be re-vaccinated according to label before entering the fairgrounds.
- Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your veterinarian).
- The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors.
- The [New York State Fair](#) requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

E. Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine to said described animal(s) or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- **Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration, and the duration of immunity if longer than one year (applies to sheep only).**
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on a paper EIA test record, the test record must be signed certifying the vaccination in addition to the required signature for the EIA test record.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is electronically entered into an eEIA test record, only one electronic signature is required.
- Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- **A veterinary clinic invoice is not sufficient proof of rabies vaccination.**
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid rabies vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.



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F. BVD-PI Testing

- All cattle, llamas, and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs, or the [New York State Fair](#) must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect **Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI)**. Official ID must be in the animal prior to sampling. The testing veterinarian is responsible to make sure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, existing official identification of the animal, and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test or official identification is not verifiable, the test must be repeated.

G. Cleaning and Disinfection

- All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

H. Animal Deaths

- Occasionally animal deaths occur at a fair. If a death occurs, it must be reported to the state veterinarian in charge as soon as possible for review. The animal must be promptly removed from the public exhibit area to a secure location and held for the veterinarian prior to disposal.

I. Calving, Kidding, and Lambing

- Any cattle, goats, or sheep that calve, kid, or lamb while at a county fair or the State Fair will be **ordered removed from the fairgrounds** along with their offspring, unless the animals are part of a birthing demonstration.

J. Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

- Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is strongly recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.



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K. Commingling of Swine and Poultry

- Due to the potential spread of influenza virus, it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

L. Isolation upon Returning Home

- The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals, the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

M. Individual Species Requirements

- Beginning in 2026, each species has its own entry requirements listed based on if animals originated from within New York or from out of state.

HORSES

NEW YORK STATE-ORIGIN HORSES:

1. No CVI required.
2. Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record, signed by a USDA Category 2 accredited veterinarian. The sample collection date for the qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January 1, 2025, for New York origin horses. The EIA test certificate must include a complete description and identification of the horse. Horse sketches/photos and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars, and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse.  - b. Poultry qualified by 90-day test must be identified by an official leg band.

-OR-

- a. Proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
- b. Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP certification information. If you utilize a receipt, it must be dated within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

OUT-OF-STATE POULTRY:

All animals entering New York State must satisfy both import requirements and fair health requirements for that species. Poultry, including waterfowl, must meet one of the movement documentation and testing protocols described below. Pigeons and doves require documentation only.

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1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 30 days prior to entry
 - a. Including identification by an official leg band
 - b. Pullorum-typhoid negative test within 90 days of entry
 - c. Negative Avian influenza test on flock in which 30 birds were tested for avian influenza within 10 days prior to entry. If there are less than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds.

-OR-

2. USDA NPIP Form 9-3
 - a. Poultry originates from an NPIP US Pullorum-Typhoid clean Flock
 - b. Negative Avian influenza test on flock in which 30 birds were tested for avian influenza within 10 days prior to entry. If there are less than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds.

-OR-

3. USDA NPIP Form 9-3
 - a. Poultry originates from NPIP US Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock
 - b. Poultry originates from NPIP US H5H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock

The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the New York fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVIs can be used multiple times for entrance into a qualifying [NYS Agricultural Fair \(linked here\)](https://www.nyfairs.org/) (<https://www.nyfairs.org/>) The initial entrance into a qualifying NYS Agricultural Fair must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. The name of the fair must be recorded on the CVI. For the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NYS Agriculture and Markets official noting the location of the initial, qualifying NYS Agricultural Fair. 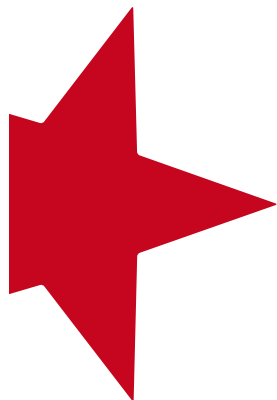

1. Contestants must be 12 years of age or older. All contestants under 16 years of age must be able to safely back up to be hooked, pull chain tight safely, and know the tractor. Discretion to be made by the superintendent prior to tractor pull start time.
2. The following are grounds for disqualification; the possession or use of alcoholic beverages and/or illicit drugs, non-compliance with the event regulations, ignoring the official's directions, fighting or verbal abuse with any competition official or contestant.
3. Contest to be governed by the officials with all decisions final. An official has the right to stop and disqualify any tractor if it is not being operated in such a manner as would be considered safe.
4. All decisions of the officials are final. No appeals will be heard.
5. Tractor can only pull 1 time per class.
6. There will be a 200 pound driver allowance.
7. Pull track to be floating finish.
8. The tractor that pulls the sled the greatest distance will be the winner. In the event of a tie, a pull-off will determine the winner.
9. Pull position will be determined at the time of registration. Drivers will be given the option to not be the first puller.
10. The number 1 puller will be the test puller, and may take the first pull if the transfer sled is okay. If he/she does not want to take the first pull, he/she may re-pull in the 3rd pull position. All decisions on re-pulls must be made before the tractor is unhooked from the sled.
11. If a tractor encounters a mechanical problem as they are hooking up or prior to hooking up, they may drop to last position in that class.

7. Title of animals over 1 year old must be shown on the registry certificate with ownership recorded by January 1st of the current year. (A nonowned) animal may be shown if the exhibitor designates the animal as a project animal and starts care for the animal by May 1st. Only 2 nonowned animals may be shown per species by an exhibitor, and only if they do not already own one of the designated species. An approved certificate of nonownership must be on file with the Oswego County 4H office or General Youth Livestock Superintendent by May 1st of the current year.
8. A child is deemed the owner of any animal if the animal is registered to the child's family's farm
9. Health and Registration papers must be presented when called for and be in possession of the exhibitor during the fair. Failure to meet the above regulations will mean that those exhibitors will be asked to leave the fair.
10. No animals are allowed in the barns until Vet Check is completed.
11. No one can sleep in the barns.
12. Animals not in control in the show ring will be disqualified.
13. Exhibitors must clean their area before leaving, and have it checked by the animal superintendent.
14. Due to safety consideration, no large animals (dairy, beef) will be shown by anyone under 8 years old except calves.
- 15. Any exhibitor entering an animal must enter their own animal in showmanship class and participate in it or forfeit all premiums.** 14A. All dairy cattle exhibitors must participate in showmanship in order to participate in conformation classes unless: A) They have won Super Showmanship once. They are welcome but not required to participate again. B) They have won Super Showmanship twice. They are not eligible to participate again.
- 16. All Junior Exhibitors must participate with fitting their animals.**
17. Showmanship classes- you must enter your class by age (as of January 1st of current year). Last year's winnings do not carry over. The judge will decide who competes for Master Showmanship. **Beginner: 5-8 years old, Novice: 9-12 years old and has never shown his/her species before, Junior: 9-13 years old and Senior: 14-18 years old.**
- 18. No bulls will be allowed in the Dairy Show**
- 19. All conflicts and rule controversies shall be presented to and resolved by the General Youth Livestock Superintendent.**



OSWEGO COUNTY FAIR YOUTH CODE OF CONDUCT

All youth exhibitors must read the following with their parents/ guardians. To participate in youth activities at the Oswego County Fair, exhibitors and parents/guardians must sign and attach this document to youth entry forms at the time of registration. **I understand that participating in the Oswego County Fair is a privilege. Many people have worked hard to provide this opportunity for me. I am representing myself, my family, my community, and the organizations with which I participate.**

As such, I agree to:

- Be courteous and respectful of others, including adult supervisors, youth participants, evaluators, and the public.
- Be respectful of and help maintain the Oswego County Fairgrounds.
- Be respectful of and show appreciation toward adult advisors and superintendents.
- Respect the personal privacy of all others.
- Contact adult supervisors or superintendents to report any issue or conflict.

In the interest of everyone's safety and personal comfort, Oswego County Fair strictly prohibits the following:

- Possession of alcohol, tobacco, fireworks, weapons, or illicit drugs.
- Possession of unapproved medications. Please have a parent/guardian inform your supervisor of any required medications you may have.
- Playing of loud or inappropriate music. Music must be played at low volume and must be appropriate for all ages.
- Engaging in inappropriate displays of affection.
- Using inappropriate language or gestures.
- Mocking, bullying, or harming the physical or emotional wellbeing of another.
- Wearing inappropriate clothing that is revealing, displays obscenities or drugs/alcohol/tobacco is NOT permitted.
- Visiting sleeping areas of any member of the opposite gender.
- Switching of beds once assigned.

To make the Oswego County Fair run smoothly, youth must:

- Attend and participate in program orientations.
- Confirm with entry clerk any entries prior to exhibiting.
- Be on time and participate in all scheduled workshops and meetings.
- Remain on the fairgrounds and at assigned program areas unless given adult permission to leave.
- Abide by curfews as assigned by advisors and superintendents. Exhibitors must be in bed with lights out by this designated time.

Because youth exhibitors are representing Oswego County agriculture, livestock exhibitors must:

- Keep their animals on the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair, with the exception of dog, horse, and sanctioned goat and rabbit show exhibitors.
- Keep their animals clean at all times.
- Keep their animal pens/housing area neat, with aisles raked.
- Keep obstacles out of walkways between animal pens.
- Be willing to answer questions to educate the public.

Youth found not abiding by the above rules and standards will be asked to leave the fairgrounds and will forfeit premiums. Removal of animals will be the responsibility of their family. Any cost incurred as a result of damaged property will be paid by the offender and his/her parents/guardians. The Oswego County Fair director has the authority to enact any further disciplinary measures, which could include, but not limited to, legal action and appearance before a county disciplinary review board, restricted participation in future youth/ 4H activities, and losing the privilege to represent Oswego County at the New York State Fair. **I have read, understand and agree to this Code of Conduct. - The animal must be clean and dry upon entering the ring for the contest
- While grooming chutes are not required, their use is encouraged; the fair will not supply grooming chutes.
- Each contestant must provide his or her own fitting equipment. No equipment will be supplied. It is recommended that contestants bring extra brushes, clipper blades, etc. No nose tongs will be allowed. All fitting equipment must be clean. All participants must wear rubber boots or work shoes.
- Youth must designate a youth assistant to restrain the animal. Holder is to be of same division and is not allowed to clip animal only the fitting contestant is allowed to clip the animal, e.g. Junior fitter holder can only help Junior fitter. Senior holders can only help senior fitter control and restrain their animal.
- No adult assistance or coaching is allowed
- Each individual will have 1 ½ hours to complete the clipping of their animal.
- For the Junior contest, each animal is required to have head and upper half of neck clipped before entering the ring for contest. The remaining part of the animal must be unclipped. Hooves should be trimmed as well.
- Any questions concerning rules and regulations should be directed to the show superintendent.

- All entries must include complete recipe, display on a disposable plate and be enclosed in a resealable transparent bag
- Exhibits with the incorrect number of specimens will be disqualified
- No mixes allowed
- Must have nutritional information (calories, fat grams, vitamins, etc.) with recipe
- No exhibits requiring refrigeration (cream or custard based pies, cakes, cream cheese, etc.) are allowed
 - Use of bread machines are allowed except for class 10
- Drop or hand shaped or pressed cookies: 3 specimens. Examples: drop chocolate chip, applesauce, oatmeal, hand shaped peanut butter, snicker doodles, crinkles. No frosting: hand shaped cookies can be rolled in sugar

CLASS:

1. Panbaked, rolled or refrigerator cookies: 3 specimens. Examples: Date bar, pumpkin bar, brownies or other batter cookie (not layered pan cookies). No frosting or added decorations that are not part of the batter
2. Frosted or decorated cookies: 3 specimens. Examples: half- moon cookies, decorated sugar cookies
3. Muffins with toppings, 3 specimens, no paper or foil baking cups. Examples: plain, whole wheat, cornbread, bran, apple, no topping
4. Muffins with toppings, 3 specimens: no paper or foil baking cups
5. Biscuits or scones: 3 specimens: examples: plain, whole wheat or flavored
6. Loaf Bread: (not yeast leavened) Entire loaf. Examples: Banana, Blueberry, apple, pumpkin
7. Yeast Rolls: 3 specimens. Examples: plain, whole grain, flavored
8. Yeast Bread: Entire loaf. Examples: plain, whole grain, flavored 1
9. Bread Machine bread: Entire loaf> Examples: Chive bread, Cheese bread
10. Shaped bread:
 - a. Small, 3 specimens. Examples: pretzels or breadsticks
 - b. Large, 1 specimen. Example: animal shaped
12. Plain cake made with shortening: at least 8" across
13. Fruit or vegetable cake at least 8" across
14. Foam cake: made in tube pan at least 9" across. Examples: angel food cake, sponge. Chiffon
15. 15. Filled, rolled cake
16. One crust fruit or vegetable pie: at least 8" across: include recipe for crust. No purchased crust
17. Two crust fruit or vegetable pie, at least 8" across: include recipe for crust. No purchased crust
18. Puff pastry
19. Baking Light: An exhibit is a sample of any baked product that is made with less fat and total calories by:
 - a. Modifying a recipe (including original and revised recipe)
 - b. Using an already modified recipe
- c. Making a traditional low fat product such as an angel food cake. The recipe and explanation of why it is low in fat must be included. Cookies, loaf bread, cake, cupcake, coffee cake, muffins, pies or other baked items (follow corresponding above class requirements. I.e. 3 specimens





20. Grown in New York: An exhibit is a sample of any baked product that contains a fruit or vegetable grown in New York State and must include:
 - a. Recipe
 - b. Explanation of ingredients grown in New York State, including where it was grown and purchased and if it was preserved for later use
 - c. Source of ingredients can be garden, upick or roadside stand, farmers market, or any market if source can be identified. Cookies, Muffins, bread, cake, coffee cake, pie or other baked items. (Following corresponding above class requirements i.e. 3 specimens)

21. Heritage Foods: An exhibit is a sample of any baked item associated with family traditions or history and must include:
 - a. Recipe
 - b. Family history and traditions associated with food. Cookies, muffins, bread, cake cupcakes, coffee cake, pie or other baked items. (Following correspondence above class requirements i.e. 3 specimens)

22. International Foods: An exhibit is sample of any baked item associated with customs and traditions of a country or population of the world and include:
 - a. Recipe
 - b. Historical background or context
 - c. Traditions associated with preparing, serving and eating the food Cookies, muffins, bread, cake, cupcakes, coffee cake, pie, or other baked items. (Follow corresponding above class requirements i.e. 3 specimens)

23. Candy: cooked 3 pieces. No melted, molded or microwaved candy

24. Preserved Foods: Any processed food, including dried foods, will be evaluated based on appearance and process used. The entry will not be used. Process must be described. Criteria for exhibiting home canned foods:
 - a. All canned foods must be processed in standard clearglass canning jars with selfsealing, two piece lids
 - b. Jars must have a vacuum seal. Jars must be exhibited and judged without screwbands
 - c. Jars must be labeled with contents, type of processing (boiling water or pressure), Time of process and altitude adjustment. (Time and method of process should agree with USDA, PNW recommendations).
 - d. Appropriated head space requirements must be followed: Fruit juices 1/4", vegetables 1/2 to 1", jams and jellies 1/2". Pickles 1/4" and tomatoes 1/2".
 - e. The following entries will be disqualified: a) foods processed and packaged not following current (1989 or later) USDA/PNW recommendations, b) paraffin sealed jams and jellies, c) jars with zinc lids, d) foods in green glass jars or e) jars with added color, bleach, sulfur or other preservations. For example: baking soda may not be added to greenvegetables and acids may not be added to nonpickled foods with the exception of tomatoes and fig).

- f. Dried/Dehydrated Foods:
 - g. Dried foods must be displayed in either clear 1/2 pint or pint size zip closure bags or jars with tight fitting lids. Foods in unapproved containers or more than one year old will not be judged
 - h. Entry card should include method of drying. Pretreatment method, (if used) source of directions and date of preparation.



- 25. Healthy Recipe Collection: An exhibit is at least 10 recipes (displayed in a box, notebook or file folder, can include photos or illustrations) that provide needed nutrients while limiting fat and total calories. For each recipe state (1) relationship of key ingredients to Food Guide Pyramid, (2) nutritional benefit, (3) source of recipe, (4) how well it was liked, (5) any changes you would make in the recipe. All recipes must be collected and made during the current year.
- 26. Heritage Recipe Collection: An exhibit is 10 recipes (displayed in a box, notebook or file folder; can include photos or illustrations) that depict family or local history. For each recipe state (1) source of recipe, (2) history related to recipe, (3) traditions related to preparing, serving and eating the food. For 4 of the 10 recipes, indicate how well it was liked after making it. The collection should represent one or more generations older than you and can be collected from family, friends, or other community sources. All Recipes must be collected and 4 of the 10 prepared during the current year.
- 27. Decorated Cake: to be judged on decoration only: (cake may be Styrofoam or made from a mix (if desired). Examples wedding cake. Birthday cake, holiday
- 28. Theme table setting: no longer than 18" x 24" one setting only. Must be on a sturdy board. Items must include a holiday or even the setting would be used for, menu and title
- 29. Any other food specimens comparable to similar food items above.

- Frames are acceptable although not required. No glass frames or covers.
- Exhibitors name and **title of exhibit** must be clearly visible

CLASS:

1. Photo Story: Narrative or informational presentation using images as illustrations to communicate story or document a process. Consists of 48 photographs of similar size with identifying or informational captions to tell a story or document a process. Exhibit may include a short narrative; conversely, most narrative work is better supported by a group of images. Exhibit will be judged on informational/narrative quality of photographs, relevance to and integration with the story. Technical quality of the overall presentation. If edited images are used, thumbnails of the originals shall accompany exhibit.
2. Photo Study Class shall consist of the following:
 - a. 4 photos demonstrating 4 methods of isolating in the subject; not more than 3 objects permitted in each photo
 - b. 4 upclose photos with a different main light source in each front, side, back and diffuse
 - c. 4 photoeach to illustrate on idea, i.e. hidden lines and shapes, framing patterns, perspective, or texture. Show differences same topic, different location, angles, etc.
3. Single unedited digital imagephotos comes straight from the camera, no modifications.
4. Single slightly edited digital imageimage somewhat digitally edited or enhanced. Modifications may include: changing color, cropping, sharpening or blurring, brightness or contrast changes, or addition of text.
5. Single heavily edited digital image: Image has been radically digitally edited or enhanced. Modifications may include: addition or removal of part pf the image, changes in the color scheme of the image, the use of filters or effects, or animation using digital images, etc.
6. Single file imageCommercially developed from 35 mm film camera, unedited, color or black and white.



7. Computer Graphic Design- a graphic to be used to promote any aspect of school, church, or youth group. Must be copy friendly, be computer generated or hand drawn graphic, and use the official logos when appropriate. If using graphics found on the internet, sources must be documented, and permission from owner received.
8. Powerpoint presentation. Submit a hardcopy of your presentation as well as a disc or flash drive.
9. Creative Framing. Create your own physical frame using materials discovered in the environment (i.e. Leaves, Sticks, pinecones). Sandwich your photo between 2 pieces of commercially framed glass, and then carefully add your own rendering to the piece. See the physical frame as a three dimensional space that uses depth in ways that stimulate viewer attention. Decorating or adding to a commercial frame is acceptable, as long as the exhibitor has "made it his own" by modification.

SECTION 1: WOOD SCIENCE

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

Class:

1. Hand Tool Item made in a Wood Science Project that was cut out, assembled and finished with hand tools only
2. Power Tool Item made in a Wood Science Project that has been partially or totally completed with power tools
3. Kit Item made in a Wood Science Project that is made from materials precut by an outside resource (i.e. commercial supplier or woodworking leader) but is assembled and finished by the exhibitor. Judges will place emphasis on the quality of workmanship performed by exhibitor. No commercial manes on exhibits
4. Miscellaneous Shop
 - Items must be a Wood Science Project that does not fit in above categories
 - Judges will place emphasis on quality of workmanship by exhibitor and the intended use of the project
 - Exhibits to be entered in this division will be at the discretion of the superintendents



SECTION 2: ELECTRICAL SCIENCE

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

CLASS:

1. Electrical Division

- Article made in an Electric Project, such as a trouble lamp, test lamp, portable bench light, extension cords, pinup or study lamp, or the rewiring of an old lamp is acceptable
- Tension restraint device must in place. Where appropriate underwriters knot should be used, especially in lamp sockets
- Due to safety code compliance, molded polarized and/or prefabricated cords with polarized plugs, where applicable are allowed
- Lamps without bulbs or shades will not be considered complete and will be evaluated accordingly
- Projects involving both woodworking and electrical tasks will be evaluated on the merits of both

2. Electronic Division:

- Article made in an Electric Project utilizing principles and construction procedures relating to electronics is acceptable
- Projects will be evaluated on the basis of soldering and connection techniques, neatness of assembly and other assembly procedures for electronic project
- Projects must be hand wire and no breadboard kits will be accepted
- Projects must be operable (I.e. contain all necessary batteries)
- **In addition to the entry card, include a short explanation of why or how the exhibit works and how it's used**

SECTION 3: ROCKETRY

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

1. Junior Division:

- Any rocket made in a rocket program either from a nonkit materials any totally assembled and finished by youth 13 years of age or younger
- Evaluators will place emphasis on proper kit assembly and finishing

2. Senior Division:

- Any rocket made from nonkit materials and totally constructed and finished by a youth 14 years and older
- Evaluators will place emphasis on proper construction techniques and finished product
- Kits may be used when incorporated with other materials to meet the requirements of an educational display as outlined in section 4 class 1





SECTION 4: CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS WITH MANUFACTURED COMPONENTS

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

- Youth entering projects in the following classes use manufactured construction pieces to complete projects. Examples are Lego*, K'nex*, Brio* and Mechano*, but projects are not limited to these examples
- Projects can incorporate design, following instructions, three dimensional thinking, design modifications, problem solving, creativity, architecture, structural design, principles of mechanics and use of color on the planning and design process
- These skills relate to the professions of engineering, science, construction, architecture and art
- Judging will be based on completion, complexity, presentation and explanation of design, understanding of principles and visual presentations
- **Following items must be included:**
 - a. Number of pieces:** Youth must know the approximate number of pieces used in assembly. For kits, this number is on the box. It is understood that after a long creative process, it may be difficult to know exact number of small pieces, the youth must provide an estimate rounded to 25
 - b. Diagrams:** diagrams are required. A diagram could be a photograph printed on printer paper, a scale drawing on graph paper, a photocopy on an instruction sheet or a variable scale rough drawing. Relevant labels and explanations must be added. The diagram must include: 1) Name of youth; 2) The Title of the project; 3) The exact or approximate number of pieces and a selfjudgment of
 - c. Complexity level** (a. easy, less than one hour to assemble; b) medium, 13 hours construction time; or c) complex, more than 3 hours of construction time. Juniors may use a photocopy of kit provided drawings for the basis of their diagrams, but brand logo must be covered and not visible. The diagram can be displayed in a plastic stand, mounted on poster board or attached in a folder. Art value, ability of written work to attract, use of color and use of font added to design presentation.
 - a. Protection:** Youth may prepare a display box for the project. There is no evaluation or points for this box; it is merely protection. A simple box could be a cardboard box with two sides removed and replaced with plastic wrap.

CLASS:

1. **Kit:** This category is restricted to juniors (ages 8-13). Juniors are limited to two projects in this class. If two projects are entered, they must differ significantly (for example a creature, a building or a vehicle). Youth must enter a completed kit. Original story must describe design process and describing play with the model. Judging criteria includes: completion, complexity (number of pieces), diagram (of the completed model and key elements labeled), explanation of the design process, difficulties and interesting elements; describe plan value, imaginative play, what steps could be taken to improve model and overall presentation.
2. **Original Model:** Youth are limited to two projects in this class, projects must differ significantly. The project can be a scene, diorama, model, building, vehicle, plants or creature. Judging criteria includes: completion, design (number of pieces, moving parts/gear systems, axle systems (wheels), hidden entrances, pulleys, joints, projectiles and hinged components; unity of design/originality, use of color, symmetry of creativity, fully developed concept diagrams/comprehensive and detailed: an overall diagram of the completed model with key elements labeled, of moving part(s) or independent component, explanation/story/written report of design process, difficulties encountered and their solutions, description of play value, future expansion of project and overall presentations.



3. Model Demonstrating a Mechanical Science Concept: Projects must be original, no kits and can include level arms, gears, pulleys, friction, belts, airfoils (flight, wine), catapults and load bearing bridges and beams. Science concepts can include energy transfer, stress, analysis, Newton's Law's, gravity, etc... Entries in this class must include a working model, an equation describing a principal of science, a labeled diagram of the project and written explanation of the science involved. Evaluation will also include presentation and visual impact of the project. Youth may conduct experiments with model and provide results in written report. Judging criteria includes: working model that demonstrates a principle of mechanical with equation displayed, labeled diagram provided that labels major parts of the model and also notes how parts or movement relates to equation; written report (no more than two pages) which explains the principle and how model illustrates the principle (may include additional page of experimental results using the model): written explanation that explains designs and construction of the model, including any difficulties and how they were overcome, description of the principle of mechanical science that is demonstrated, clear understanding of scientific principle and explanation of how the model illustrates principle; and overall visual impact of project as prepared for display, including attractiveness of display.
4. Transportation Designs: applies transportation pieces as Brio* in which youth design a transportation system (road, railroad). Drawings are to be hand drawn. Judging criteria: presentation labeled with name of exhibitor and title of project to include schematic of system drawn to scale, roads, railroads and bridges clearly labeled or identified in the legend, senior to use 11 x 17 drawing paper, must have fully developed concept, clear details, completeness of system (no dead ends) and show creativity; legend that explains the meaning of symbols such as roads, railroads, bridge, water, vegetation, buildings; written explanation that explains the design and the visual impact as prepared for display and attractiveness

SECTION 5: SCIENCE EXPERIMENTS AND EXHIBITS

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

1. Educational Display/Descriptive Science
 - Series of posters (at least 14" X 22") and/or a 3 dimensional exhibits related to an engineering science project
 - Display should be selfexplanatory through use of signs or labels and limited to approximately card table size
 - Topics may include such things as engine parts or bicycle parts display boards, electric circuit boards, electric quiz games, safety rules for bicycling or working in a wood shop or with electricity
 - Entry will be evaluated on the purpose or principle idea, effectiveness in illustrating one idea, appearance, arrangements and description of display
2. Citizen Science Project
 - Exhibits can be of any public service, citizen science or public education watch activity you took part in that had a scientific component to it
 - Watershed rehabilitation, loss lady bug project, recycling program and educational models, etc.
 - Project exhibit posters must be clearly labeled with a written statement of what the project is, how it is related to science, and why you are interested in that project
3. Science Experiments
 - An opportunity for participants to learn about and experience science concepts in an area of agriculture, human ecology of life sciences that the participant really enjoys
 - Individual or group entries are encouraged
 - Entries must follow Rules and Regulations of the Youth Building
 - Entry Card must be attached to the exhibit
 - Any type or combination of the types of science projects below along with creativity is encouraged
 - Attach photos and diagrams, along with sheets of white paper that include your experiment description within these sections: 1) introduction; 2) Hypothesis; 3) methods; 4) results: and 5) your conclusion

Geology Simple collection must include the specimen's names, dates of collection, specific site(s) of collection (distance and direction to nearest town, county, state or providence) and collector's name for 10 specimens. Inclusion of field journals is strongly encouraged and identification criteria must be completely and clearly defined. Exhibits showing evolutionary histories adaptations of fossil organisms, vertical or horizontal studies of strata, or similar studies are encouraged
3. Field Identification Projects Collections of preserved specimens, photographs or sketches properly labeled and showing identification criteria may be displayed for any habitat in New York, consult your local Department of Environmental Conservation for guidelines and permission in collecting specimens from the wild. Collection should have a 10 specimen minimum
4. County or self initiated projects that relate to environmental education. Examples include but are not limited to interpretation of aerial photographs, vegetation, maps, plant adaptations, demonstrations of ecological principals; or computer models like GIS. Transfer of display ideas and concepts from other project area is encouraged.



SECTION 2: FISHERIES AND AQUATIC RESOURCES

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

CLASS:

1. Exhibits may be displayed or records of any fisheries and Aquatic Resources related activities including but not limited to fishing techniques, aquatic sampling methods, aquatic insect ecology, habitat improvement of fisheries management and biology. Dip nets, such dishes and aquatic food chair display
2. Fly tying: at least 2 different files tied by the exhibitor, mounted and labeled
3. Projects related to fish or fishing, including aquaculture, commercial fisheries, sport fisheries or related equipment skills or observation, fishing rod/poles, fishing lures, life cycle of fish, fish identification chart, fishing knots and fishing hook display fish prints

SECTION 3: FORESTRY

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

1. Know your trees: a collection of leaves and twigs from at least 6 specimens; fruit may be included. Must be properly pressed, mounted, identified, and labeled
2. Backyard Maple Syrup: example of maple syrup, maple sugar, or maple cream by exhibitor, bring 2 samples.
3. Displays and presentations may be based upon, but are not limited to, the following projects: firewood identification of lumbar, common tree pests or diseases, forest management plan.

SECTION 4: RESOURCE BASED EDUCATION

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

1. Shooting Sports: Any exhibit or record based upon content of an accredited shooting sport FIREARMS. program of any of the NYS DEC certificate program. Such as homemade bows, arrows, and a display on parts of a gun, safety. **NO AMMUNITION OR ACTUAL FIREARMS.**
2. Other Outdoor Recreation: Exhibits based upon related outdoor recreation activities, e.g. orienteering cross country skiing, snowboarding, wilderness camping, or outdoor cookery
3. Open Class: Option for exhibits deemed to be worthwhile but fall outside the categories described above. This class is also expected to follow the project story requirement listed at the beginning of this section.

SECTION 5: WILDLIFE

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

CLASS:

1. Bird Study Consult Bluebirds of N.Y. Society or any other bird materials for exhibit ideas. Nests or egg displays, different types of birdseed, how different beaks and bills or feet, migration, pathways, bird count dairy, bluebird, nest boxes, wood duck houses, nesting platforms, birdfeeders, birdhouses
2. Trapping Furbearers Exhibits based upon NYSDEC Trapper Training Program are acceptable, as are displays of equipment, pelt preparation, and discussions of the role of trapping in wildlife management
3. Mammals of Oswego Countydisplay of 10 mammals of Oswego County highlighting either: 1) habitat and diet, 2) tracks, 3) scat. Can include photos (drawn, photographs or clippings from magazines) of the mammals.
4. Other Wildlife Projectsexhibits based upon New York's wildlife resources: bat houses, butterfly houses, invasive species, endanger species, animal lifecycles, and other wildlife projects

SECTION 6: SOLID WASTE

Premiums: Blue \$2.00, Red \$1.50, White \$1.00

CLASS:

1. Exhibits based on recycling or composing projects in the home or community
2. Clothing and other items created using postconsumer waste materials

- All entries must be received by June 20, 2026
 - All entries must be accompanied by an entry fee of \$5.00 for each contestant per act. Make check/money order payable to Agricultural Society of Oswego County
 - Please note that we are using many of the NY State Fair rules and format
 - This contest is available to amateurs only
1. All contestants must be legal residents of Oswego County. Residents of other counties may enter the talent competition here if your county does not have an annual County Fair, or if other circumstances exist that prevent you from entering your own County Fair.
 2. There are 2 divisions for the talent competition. All Mini Competition (for the age of 12 years and under) will perform 1st, The NY State Fair Showcase has a specific cutoff date for 12 year olds. If you are now 12 and will turn 13 by September 1st, please contact the director for clarification on this ruling. No contestant over the age of 14 can compete in the Mini Division. This includes the accompanist. In groups of two or more if 50% of the group is age 13 and over, they must compete in the Maxi Division. The Maxi Division will compete immediately after.
 3. Time limit for each act must not exceed 5 minutes- any act over 5 minutes will be disqualified
 4. At the Oswego County Level, contestants can perform one solo and up to two more times in each category for a maximum of 3 times. This is the same as the New York State regulations if your act is chosen for the State Fair. Only one solo is allowed for either Fair, but you can appear a total of 3 times
 5. If your act is selected for the NYS Fair, you must perform the same act and/or the same number that you did at the county level, including your costume
 6. There is no limit to the number of participants in each act. Please do consider the size of our stage when planning for this event. Our stage measures approximately 40 feet wide by 20 feet deep
 7. Teachers are permitted to compete in their professional talent area
 8. Each act must have its own entry form. Groups should prepare a list of additional participants and attach it to the application. The entry fee applies to all participants
 9. If your act is selected for the NY State Fair, you do have the option to not participate at that
 10. No bands are allowed to compete
 11. The decision of the judging panel and director are final

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Oswego County will provide the buckets and the items known as junk. The goal is to use all the items in the bucket but not the bucket to create a sculpture based on the Oswego County Fair's theme. The finished sculptures will be displayed in the Agriculture/ Domestic Arts Building for the entire fair. 2026 theme is Farm, Family, Freedom.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Open to all ages. This is not a 4-H member only contest. NO ENTRY FEE
2. The contest is limited to 15 applicants (individual or team) and will be on the first come first serve basis. There will be a waiting list to replace any applicant that drops out of the contest before the fair, as well as any applicant that does not collect their bucket of supplies.
3. Buckets must be picked up at the Oswego County Fair on Saturday, June 6 2026 between 10am and 2pm. If you cannot make this time period, arrangements for an alternative time can be made with the Superintendent prior to pick up date.
4. Sculptures are to be dropped off at the Agriculture/ Domestic Arts Building on Tuesday June 30, 2026 1:00pm-3:00 pm and 5:30pm-7:30pm.
5. If this is not a convenient time, please contact the superintendent before June 28, 2026 to schedule an appointment for drop off. No exceptions.
6. When delivering the sculpture, please return your bucket.
7. Sculptures are to be picked up on July 5, 2026 6pm-8pm and Monday July 6, 2026 10am-12pm.
8. Any sculpture not claimed by Noon on July 6 th will be disposed of.

JUDGING CRITERIA

1. Contestant used only the materials that were provided (required) 25%
2. Contestant used materials in a new way to create something different. 25%
3. Contestant's ideas are recognizable (clarity of idea) 25%
4. Contestant's overall finished appearance of the sculpture, including the difficulty of the piece and how well it was made 25%



GENERAL INFORMATION

- A. The objective of "Bucket of Junk" is to create a sculpture using only the items in the bucket. A sculpture is defined as a three-dimensional work of art that can be viewed from 360 degrees.
- B. All sculptures must be submitted and presentation ready to be accepted. Sculptures not meeting this requirement may not be judged.
- C. Judges must know where you used each item in the bucket. Please note, you must use each item provided. You do not need to use the entire item in the sculpture but there must be enough used to make it visible. The only optional pieces in the bucket are the packaging from different items i.e. cardboard packaging, plastic bag, etc. However, if you want to use it, you may. They are just not mandatory.
- D. You may not add any additional items to your sculpture. Only the items in the bucket are permitted to be part of your sculpture. The bucket may not be used as part of the sculpture. There will be a list of contents in each bucket. Please indicate on the list where each item was used. Please return this list completely filled out when you drop off your sculpture.
- E. You can cut, sand, glue, weld, bolt, fasten, bend, shape, curl, staple, and paint these items to make your sculpture.
- F. You may connect your entry to a solid base for stability, if needed. The base CANNOT be part of the sculpture. The base must also be smaller than the sculpture, and it is NOT to be painted. The base will not be considered part of your sculpture so it will not be judged.
- G. The bucket and contents list must be returned when you bring the sculpture to the fairgrounds for display. The bucket is not to be used as part of the sculpture.
- H. Any sculpture larger than 24L x 24W inches will automatically be disqualified.
- I. Your sculpture must be completely finished when it arrives. No painting, construction, etc. will be allowed.
